Voters approve safety and security capital project

Voters approved a \$2 million capital project with a focus on the safety and security of students and staff. The vote results showed a less than exciting turnout, but overwhelmingly approved the project with proposed improvements in the District to include: renovating/adding secure entrances, door and window hardening, exterior enhancements, and other work related to increasing the security of APW Schools. The district's security does not stop with this project, though. District officials will now be able to use the new secure environment to more effectively implement improved safety procedures for our schools. The District believes in taking a proactive approach to school security and this ideal will be reflected in this project and safety procedural improvements.

Hovercraft Project puts STEAM into action




Autumn Holmes is all smiles as she navigates across the gymnasium on a hovercraft.

Sometimes life gets difficult and sometimes you want to cry or give up, said Matt Chase of Chase Educational Consulting, who developed the Hovercraft Project that visited Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Elementary School recently. That's life, Chase told the students, but perseverance and determination are two character traits that will make you successful.

Teams of students worked together to construct and operate a self-propelled hovercraft using little more than a platform, a frame, a piece of Tyvek-type paper, a leaf blower and lots of ingenuity and teamwork.

Chase worked with the

Erroneous Delivery Becomes Student Butterfly Project




Late one evening a shipment marked "live specimens" arrived in error at the loading dock of the Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Junior/Senior

High School. The company who shipped the package was contacted to arrange for return of the shipment. They explained that if the box was returned, the "specimens" inside would not survive the trip, so the company suggested the school keep the shipment if they could use them. The live specimens were painted lady

butterfly caterpillars, so Laurie Parker contacted one of the science teachers to see if they were interested in using the caterpillars in science class.

Realizing that this was a golden opportunity for the students, the science teacher said yes and returned to the school to set up the butterfly habitat. The specimens were divided between two classes and the study of the life cycle of butterflies began.

The butterflies became a wonderful handson project-based learning opportunity that taught some valuable life-lessons as well as the scientific study of the butterfly. Students researched the life cycle of the specimens and the specific needs to keep them alive



they could be released, but they also learned a great deal about life. They learned

about empathy, responsibility, consistency, dependability and so much more in the nurturing and upkeep of the caterpillars as they transformed and became butterflies. Daily

(Continued from previous page) observations and scientific notations about the progress provided an opportunity for research and individual further exploration was encouraged.

On the day of the release of the adult butterflies, students in both classes gathered outside as the mesh enclosures were opened and the butterflies flew out, fluttering around the students for a moment before heading out into the world. Painted lady butterflies are some of the most prevalent on the planet and are found in five of the seven continents. They have unusual migration patterns and are one of the fastest flying butterflies, covering up to 100 miles per day during their migration. Their favorite food plant is thistle and their scientific name "Vanessa cardui" actually translates to "butterfly of thistle."



APW students selected for All-State

Five students from Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Junior-Senior High School were recommended for participation in All-State Chorus. The students, under the direction of Chorus Director Mary Ann Clarke-House auditioned for the spots last spring and were selected based on several criteria including: recommendation by their choral director, score on their performance of a level VI solo during the audition process, adjudicator recommendation, previous NYSSMA solo ratings, grade in school, zone representation, and participation in previous year's All-State and other performing organizations.

More than 6,500 students began the selection process, with only about 900 from across the state earning the honor. The participating students were notified at the start of the school year of their acceptance into the prestigious All-State Chorus. They will join with others from their region in a special concert on November 17th at SUNY Potsdam.

communicated through team leaders and task-specific individuals focusing on good leadership, communication, collaboration and positivity. The project took the students through the design phase where they were asked to draw the largest perfect circle they could on a piece of Tyvek-type material that would become the skirt for their hovercraft. The teams were given minimal materials that included a piece of string, ink pen, two yard sticks, several different colored markers and a pair of scissors. The students worked together to determine how best to measure and mark their perfect circle using skills they have not yet learned in math class.

Teachers and adults were cautioned not to assist the students but rather to let the students come to the answer through their own means of communicating and collaborating with each other. 'What makes a perfect circle' asked one teacher? 'It doesn't have any edges,' answered a student. 'Neither does an oval,' the teacher responded, 'so what makes it a perfect circle?' 'Well, it's the same distance from the center,' was the response and the light went off in the student's eye as they grasped the concept and came to the discovery of how to draw that perfect circle.

The project became a learning experience for students and teachers alike with one teacher commenting, "I think we are too easy on our students in the classroom because we don't want to see them struggle, but look how they are successful through, and because of, that struggle and look how they get to that point of discovery without us handing them the answer."

More than a science, technology, engineering and math project, the event also allowed for creative expression, infusing art into the mix, creating a STEAM-based learning experience.

In addition, Chase spoke about self-empowerment and confidence. He asked them for labels that people tried to call them and wrote those negative words on his arm in a symbolic message to the group that he was taking on their burden and releasing them from that negative label. Just because he had the word, or label, on him, he explained to the students that it didn't make it true.

"Don't let anyone take your value from you," Chase said, "You own that, don't let anyone tell you that you're not valuable."

The Hovercraft Project was coordinated through the Center for Instruction, Technology & Innovation and visited all nine districts in Oswego County.

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
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Rebel Day Carnival and Back to School Picnic
